A Christmas Candy Recipe "See's Fudge"

1 cube butter

1 sm. can evaporated milk 1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 cup chopped walnuts (optional)

In top of a double boiler, melt marshmallows and cube of butter. In separate pan, combine the sugar and evaporated milk. Stir and bring to a boil. Boil exactly one minute.

Combine ingredients of the two pans in one pan (either pan). Add vanilla and chocolate chips. Stir until chocolate chips are melted. Stir in nuts. Pour into an 8"x8" square pan lined with wax paper. Place in frig over night to set and mellow. Cut fudge into squares and keep in Tupperware. Fudge may be kept several days in the refrigerator without spoiling.
