To help empty the holding tanks, treat them with the "Murphy Solution" Mix one cup water softener(king or Calgon) -King is cheaper- one cup low sudsing laundry, or dish washing detergent, mix/dissolve in one/two gallon pail and dump in to holding tanks. Makes the tank surfaces slippery, stuff is released easily. (All ways add a couple gallons water to BLACK tank along

with your treatment) before use. ~Marvin Lee

- · Speaking of on the road problems...if you can't change your own tires like we can't, or you do break down, roadside assistance is worth every penny! Our double blowout cost us \$385. That was the cost of 2 tires and tax. Service call, labor, mounting and balance was covered by the road service. We also picked up a nail in a front tire and just needed the spare put on...No additional charge!
